Repairing the World: Jewish Artists in Chicago, 1915-45 with Dr. Susan Weininger
There were many Jewish artists working in Chicago in the early part of the 20th century, most of
them identified with the progressive and modernist styles of the avant-garde. While Jewish artists
had their own groups, their own exhibition venues, and even a Jewish publisher who promoted
their work actively, they were also integrated into the wider art community. They were
disproportionately interested in issues of social justice in their work, addressing the core Jewish
idea of Tikkun Olam (repairing the world) through their art.

Dr. Susan Weininger is Professor Emerita of Art History at Roosevelt University. She has curated exhibitions, written extensively, and lectured on Chicago artists. She currently serves on the Board of the New Deal Center of Roosevelt University, the advisory Board of the Illinois Women Artists Project, and the exhibitions committee of the Illinois Holocaust Memorial and Education Center. She is a past president of Anshe Emet Synagogue and a docent at the Illinois Holocaust Memorial and Education Center.

REAL ISRAEL

Last week we talked about Israel's efforts to reach the moon by the end of this year (really). In case you missed it, *SpaceIL* was Israel's entry in the Google Lunar X Prize Moon Race. The first team to soft-land a privately funded, unmanned robot on the moon by March 31, 2018 would receive \$20 million. That prize expired without a winner. The Google Lunar X Prize Moon Race was established in 2007 to inspire innovators from around the world to develop low-cost methods of robotic space exploration. *SpaceIL* was the first of 16 competitors to sign a launch contract, and one of only five teams to proceed in the contest.

XPRIZE or not, *SpaceIL*, undeterred, is moving forward with its quest to land on the moon this year.

Prof. Oded Aharonson of the Weizmann Institute of Science has helped the team determine where to land the spacecraft on the moon (Mare Serenitatis).

Engine and fuel tanks were recently integrated (we use space terminology when we can) into the spacecraft's body at IAI's space facility. Cameras were also integrated after passing a test which simulates space's extreme temperatures. *SpaceIL* has signed a contract for satellite communication services which will keep track of the location of the spacecraft on its journey to the moon.

Recently team members went to Cape Canaveral to begin coordinating with all the entities taking part in the launch, particularly SpaceX, the supplier of the rocket which will carry the module.

One of *SpaceIL*'s goals is to inspire Israel's youth to explore STEM subjects. The organization recently sponsored an activity at the Holon Technological Fair designed to challenge the creative thinking, spatial vision, and mathematical thinking of 30,000 Israeli ninth-graders.
